Post Summary:

Applications are invited from registered medical practitioners for the post of Consultant Haematologist based at the Western General Hospital (WGH), Edinburgh and St John's Hospital (SJH), Livingston. This is a replacement post. This is a 10 programmed activity position available immediately. This post will include an on-call commitment at the WGH for out-of-hours including haemato-oncology cover for NHS Lothian and NHS Borders.

The main objectives of the post are:



- Provision of clinical and laboratory consultative haematology services, working together in a team of Consultant Haematologists
- Provision of professional direction and clinical responsibility for the haematology and transfusion laboratory at the SJH
- To be research active and contribute to the expansion of the department's clinical trials programme
- Provision of sub-speciality emphasis in management of myeloproliferative neoplasms that complements existing expertise within the departments
- Contribution to teaching/training, audit and managerial responsibilities as appropriate to experience

Applicants should possess Fellowship of the Royal College of Pathologists or equivalent qualification, and also Membership/Fellowship of the Royal College of Physicians (UK) or equivalent qualification, and be on the GMC Specialist Register for Haematology or be within 6 months of achievement of CCT.

Section 3: Departmental and Directorate Information

3.1 Clinical Haematology Services: WGH

The Clinical Haematology Department is part of Edinburgh Cancer Centre.

Edinburgh Cancer Centre is based at the Western General Hospital (WGH), which is a rapidly developing academic health science cancer campus. The University of Edinburgh's Institute for Genetics and Molecular Medicine and the CRUK Edinburgh Centre are co-located on this shared campus. The Centre provides a wide range of local, regional and national services across 11 sites in South East Scotland.

The Haematology Department at the Western General Hospital provides general haematology services for the northern and western areas of Edinburgh. Regional services for patients with haematological malignancies are provided for Midlothian, East Lothian and West Lothian. Supraregional services for autologous haematopoietic stem transplants around 40 per year are provided for the Lothians, Fife, Borders and Highland regions. Clinical haematology services are provided in facilities which are currently undergoing major refurbishment and a new Edinburgh Haematology Centre is planned to open in May 2021. The magnificent, stage-of-the-art facilities include a 19-bed (all single occupancy) ward with a brand new co-located 30 chair/room day ward. A Southeast Scotland managed clinical network for haematological malignancies is well established.

There are currently eight consultants supporting the clinical and diagnostic haematology service, with seven working in 3 teams – “myeloid”, “lymphoid” and “myeloproliferative neoplasms – MPN” with cross-cover arranged within teams. One consultant supports the regional transplant service as well as early phase trials. The MPN service is further supported by a Clinical Nurse Specialist (0.6 wte).

The Department is led by Dr Angus Broom, Clinical Director for Adult Haematology Services.

The General Manager of Edinburgh Cancer Centre is Denise Calder and the Associate Medical Director is Dr Larry Hayward.



3.2 Haematology Research facilities

There is a dedicated research team for the haematology oncology service that comprises 3 research nurses and 2 data managers. There is a clinical trials pharmacy team that supports both the Haematology and Oncology trials activity. There is also a pharmacist who has a dedicated role relating to advanced therapeutics. Clinical trials activity takes place within the outpatient, day ward and inpatient wards at the Western General hospital, and outpatient and day ward at St John's Hospital. There is access to the Phase 1 clinical trials unit within the Edinburgh Cancer centre and the Wellcome Trust Clinical Research Facility based at the Western General Hospital.

3.3 Haematology Laboratory Service: WGH

The Haematology Laboratory Service provides district and supra-regional services. There is close liaison with general practitioners in north and west Edinburgh. Supra-regional services for Lothians, Fife and Borders include immunophenotyping and molecular diagnostics. The regional cytogenetics laboratory is on the WGH site.

3.4 Clinical Haematology Service: SJH

St John's Hospital is a busy district general hospital which opened in 1989. The catchment area for St John's Hospital covers West Lothian in addition to parts of Edinburgh City council area, making an approximate total catchment population of 200,000. Most common specialities are on site including Medical Receiving but not Emergency Surgery. Facilities include Intensive Care Unit, Coronary Care Unit, Paediatrics, Obstetrics, Supra-regional Plastic Surgery and Burns, surgical specialties including ENT, Psychiatry, Oncology, Hospital Palliative Care, Macmillan Palliative Care Outpatient Unit and the Emergency Department. The Radiology Department provides most imaging modalities including MRI and Interventional Radiology. SJH has University of Edinburgh Teaching Hospital status. Fifth year medical students attend for regular teaching at haematology clinics, tutorials and within the laboratory.

A refurbished and expanded "Edinburgh Cancer Centre @St John's Hospital" unit opened in 2020 providing a modern and larger area for clinics, patient assessments, procedures and SACT delivery. Clinical trials are run from the outpatient clinic and dayward, with support from an on-site research nurse.

There are currently three consultants (including this post) supporting the clinical and diagnostic haematology service at St Johns, each on a 0.6 wte basis at SJH with the remaining time spent at WGH.

3.5 Haematology Laboratory Service: SJH

The Department of Clinical & Laboratory Haematology at St John's Hospital has UKAS accreditation. The laboratory provides Haematology and Blood Transfusion Laboratory service and liaison advice to medical, surgical, paediatric and obstetric/gynaecological units and general practitioners.



Section 4: Main Duties and Responsibilities

Clinical:

- The post holder will be expected to participate in all aspects of the clinical and laboratory services at SJH (6 sessions) and the WGH (4 sessions) as appropriate to his/her qualifications and experience, in collaboration with existing consultant staff. This will include a consultative service to other hospital specialties. Laboratory commitments will include working to ensure continuing UKAS accreditation.
- It is expected that he/she will have an interest in myeloproliferative neoplasms that complements existing interest within the department.
- The post holder will be expected to take an active role participating in, and supporting the Southeast Scotland Cancer Network (SCAN).
- The post holder will be encouraged to promote research within the department; this may be in collaboration with current research groups.
- The post holder will be expected to contribute to the management of the department at a level commensurate with his/her qualifications and experience, and to co-operate with the operational policies of the department and division.
- The post holder will be expected to maintain his/her professional knowledge and competence and to participate in the Royal College of Pathologists continuing professional development scheme.
- The post holder will be expected to communicate with other professionals and departments in order to ensure a co-ordinated approach to patient care.
- The post holder will be expected to participate in establishing and monitoring clinical audit projects involving the service delivery of the department.
- The post holder will be expected to participate in the NHS Lothian consultant appraisal and revalidation process.
- The post holder will be expected to assist with the training, supervision and continuing education of technical and junior medical staff.

Out of Hours Commitments:

- The post holder will participate in the out-of-hours consultant on-call rota for the WGH haematology department on a 1:6.6 rota. When on call out-of-hours he/she will also be asked to cover both NHS Lothian and NHS Borders.
- The post holder will participate in the 9 am – 5 pm consultant on-call rota for the WGH haematology department on a 1:7.6 rota.

Location:

- It is anticipated the principal base of work will be Western General Hospital and St John's Hospital.



- The post holder may be required to work at any of NHS Lothian's sites.

Provide high quality care to patients:

- Maintain GMC specialist registration and hold a licence to practice
- Develop and maintain the competencies required to carry out the duties of the post
- Ensure patients are involved in decisions about their care and respond to their views

Research, Teaching and Training:

- Where possible to collaborate with academic and clinical colleagues to enhance NHS Lothian's research portfolio, at all times meeting the full requirements of Research Governance
- To provide high quality teaching to medical undergraduates and members of other health care professions
- To act as educational supervisor and appraiser to ensure external accreditation of training posts with an appropriate allocation of SPA time for these roles

Medical Staff Management:

- To work with colleagues to ensure junior doctors' hours are compliant in line with EWTD and New Deal
- To ensure that adequate systems and procedures are in place to control and monitor leave for trainee and specialty doctors and to ensure that there is appropriate cover within the clinical areas, including on-call commitments
- To participate in the recruitment of trainee and specialty doctors as and when required
- To participate in team objective setting as part of the annual job planning process

Governance:

- Participate in clinical audit, incident reporting and analysis and to ensure resulting actions are implemented
- Ensure clinical guidelines and protocols are adhered to by doctors in training and updated on a regular basis
- Keep fully informed about best practice in the specialty areas and ensure implications for practice changes are discussed with the Clinical Director
- Role model good practice for infection control to all members of the multidisciplinary team

Strategy and Business Planning:

- To participate in the clinical and non-clinical objective setting process for the directorate

Leadership and Team Working:

- To demonstrate excellent leadership skills with regard to individual performance, clinical teams and NHS Lothian and when participating in national or local initiatives
- To work collaboratively with all members of the team

The Job Plan is negotiable and will be agreed between the successful applicant, and the Clinical Director. NHS Lothian initially allocates all consultants 10 PAs made up of 9 PAs in Direct Clinical Care (DCC) and one core SPA for CPD, audit, clinical governance, appraisal, revalidation job planning, internal routine communication and management meetings. As a major teaching and research contributor, NHS Lothian would normally expect to allocate additional SPA time for activities to do with undergraduate education, educational supervision of trainee medical staff, research and other activities. These are all areas where NHS Lothian has a strong commitment and we recognise the contribution that consultants are both willing and eager to make. Precise allocation of SPA time and associated objectives will be agreed with the successful applicant and will be reviewed at annual job planning.
