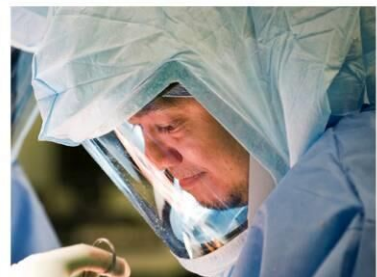

Job Title: Consultant Gynaecology Oncologist

Department: Department of Gynaecology, Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh

Base: Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh (RIE)

The post may include working at other hospitals within the South East Scotland Cancer Network

Post Summary:

This post is a substantive consultant post in gynaecology oncology based at the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh. The post holder will join a team of four other subspecialist gynaecology oncologists in Edinburgh.

The post holder will be subspecialist trained in gynaecological cancer and able to manage women with ovarian, cervical, endometrial and vulval cancer.

The post holder will be expected to work collaboratively with colleagues in colorectal and hepatobiliary surgery, and urology as necessary for the surgical management of patients with advanced gynaecological cancer. The successful applicant would be expected to do an all day operating list at the Western General Hospital with the colorectal surgeons once a month.

Section 3: Departmental and Directorate Information

The South East Scotland Cancer Area Network (SCAN) comprises the RIE/WGH/SJH in Lothian as its centre with cancer units in NHS Fife (Victoria Hospital, Kirkcaldy), NHS Borders (Borders General Hospital, Melrose) and NHS Dumfries & Galloway (Dumfries and Galloway Royal Infirmary, Dumfries). We see 160 – 180 ovarian cancers per year and around 275 – 300 other gynaecological cancers in the SCAN region.

There is a weekly MDM based at the WGH and teleconferenced between hospitals within SCAN. There is also a fortnightly combined colorectal/urology/gynaecology/oncology MDM to discuss patients requiring complex pelvic surgery. This has been introduced specifically to improve radical surgery and exenterative surgery for ovarian cancer. As a consequence, there are strong links with our colleagues in colorectal surgery, hepatobiliary surgery and urology.

We have established a complex abdominal and pelvic surgery service for cytoreductive surgery in patients with advanced ovarian cancer. There are fortnightly all day operating lists at RIE with the hepatobiliary and colorectal teams. The post holder will be expected to participate in and develop further radical primary surgery for ovarian cancer.

In 2021 the Scottish Government invested in robotic surgery and we have two Da Vinci robots based in the RIE and NHS Fife that will be used for laparoscopic hysterectomy and lymphadenectomy in patients with endometrial cancer. The established gynaecology oncology consultants are being trained in robotic surgery and it is anticipated that the successful candidate would also be involved in this programme.



The Simpson Centre for Reproductive Health at the RIE is the main centre for perinatal care in South East Scotland. There were approximately 6500 deliveries in 2020. The SCRH is the tertiary referral centre for the South East of Scotland and is the largest obstetric unit in Scotland. The hospital includes an intensive care Neonatal Unit, with 12 Level 1 Intensive Care, seven Level 2 Intensive Care and 24 Special Care cots.

The obstetric and gynaecology service at St. John's comprises 26 obstetric beds, including a day bed unit, and 18 gynaecological beds (10 in-patient and eight day beds/23 hour stay beds in a dedicated Day Case Surgical Facility). In 2020 the department handled approximately 2,300 deliveries and had over 5000 new gynaecological outpatient referrals. Four weekly high risk antenatal clinics are held and in addition there is a weekly multiple pregnancy, diabetic and maternal medicine clinic and a monthly haematology clinic. The obstetric unit is supported by a SCBU. Special interests of the department include urogynaecology, laparoscopic surgery, gynaecology oncology, menstrual dysfunction (including out patient hysteroscopy) and maternal medicine.

There is large general gynaecological workload with approximately 500 hysterectomies (abdominal, laparoscopic and vaginal) and 5,000 day cases being performed per annum. Over 20,000 new gynaecological out-patients are seen per year (including those seen in peripheral clinics). Sub-specialty interests include gynaecological oncology, urogynaecology, infertility, endometriosis and menstrual dysfunction. Within the Simpson Centre for Reproductive Health, there is the Edinburgh Fertility and Reproductive Endocrinology Centre (EFREC) for patients with endocrine and infertility problems. In 2015 the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh became accredited as an Endometriosis Centre of Expertise.

A new Short Stay Elective Centre (SSEC) is being built at the St John's Hospital site and is expected to open in 2025/2026. The SSEC will have 11 operating theatres 38 in patient beds and 24 day surgery beds. It will look after patients with up to a 48 hour postoperative stay.

Section 4: Main Duties and Responsibilities

Clinical

This post is principally designed to support the gynaecological oncology service in NHS Lothian and wider South East Scotland Cancer Area Network (SCAN).

The job plan will include major operating lists at RIE. The post holder will operate at the WGH with the colorectal team one day each month and be involved in the cytoreductive surgery programme at RIE. There is a weekly "Rapid Access" new patient clinic and a follow up oncology clinic.

The post holder will attend the weekly SE Scotland MDM, which is held on a Thursday morning (08:30 – 10:00) and is teleconferenced between all units in the SE Scotland Cancer Network. The MDM is followed by a combined gynaecology oncology clinic.

In addition the job plan will include involvement with the complex pelvic surgery service which has been set up to enable organisation of more complex pelvic surgery where bowel or urinary tract surgery is anticipated. This involves a fortnightly MDM at the WGH with the colorectal and urology surgical teams, radiologists, CNSs and support staff.

Sentinel node and reconstructive surgery for vulval disease has been introduced and would offer an exciting opportunity for candidates to join this collaborative service with the plastic surgery department.

Total laparoscopic hysterectomy and pelvic lymphadenectomy is well established for the management of endometrial cancer in Edinburgh. The team are currently being trained in robotic surgery for endometrial cancer and it is anticipated that the post holder will be involved in the robotic programme.

On average there will be 0.5 PA of prospective cover for theatre or for daytime on call or clinics per week. This is designed to enable the department to maintain waiting list and waiting time targets and may take place during any non-DCC fixed session. The clinical administration and SPA time will be taken flexibly around the prospective cover.

This is an exposure prone post and evidence of the relevant immunities will be required before taking up post.

The post holder will be expected to have excellent team working skills given the multi-disciplinary nature of the job.

Out of Hours Commitments

On call is for gynaecology with a frequency of 1:12 with prospective cover. On occasion the post holder may be asked to assist obstetric colleagues in the case of major obstetric haemorrhage or a gynaecological complication of pregnancy. There are ongoing discussions about a second tier rota for the management of major obstetric haemorrhage.

Location

This post will be based at RIE. The post holder will be expected to operate 1:4 Fridays at WGH with the colorectal surgeon on patients with advanced ovarian cancer.



Research and Development

The Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh is the site of the University's Queens Medical Research Institute of which the Centre for Reproductive Biology is a key component. This is the largest aggregation of reproductive scientists and clinicians in Europe and offers unique opportunities for research collaboration in all areas of obstetrics and gynaecology. Currently the most prominent areas of clinical research include fertility control (conception and contraception), gynaecological endocrinology, menstrual dysfunction, endometriosis, gonad and gamete biology, fetomaternal disorders, placenta function and the biological control of parturition. There is an active research programme in ovarian cancer based at the oncology department of the WGH.

Teaching and training

NHS Lothian is a centre for subspecialty training in gynaecology oncology with a subspecialty trainee currently in post. Advanced training skill modules (ATSM) in gynaecology are available for trainees in years ST6/7. The post holder will be expected to take part in the training of specialty registrars as well as teaching and training of GPSTs, FY2s and medical students attached to the department.

Other aspects that will be expected of the post holder:

Medical Staff Management:

To work with colleagues to ensure junior doctors' hours are compliant in line with EWTD and New Deal

To participate in team objective setting as part of the annual job planning process

Governance:

Participate in clinical audit, incident reporting and analysis and to ensure resulting actions are implemented

Ensure clinical guidelines and protocols are adhered to by doctors in training and updated on a regular basis

Keep fully informed about best practice in the specialty areas and ensure implications for practice changes are discussed with the Clinical Director

Role model good practice for infection control to all members of the multidisciplinary team

Strategy and Business Planning:

To participate in the clinical and non-clinical objective setting process for the directorate

Leadership and Team Working:

To demonstrate excellent leadership skills with regard to individual performance, clinical teams and NHS Lothian and when participating in national or local initiatives

To work collaboratively with all members of the team

To resolve conflict and difficult situations through negotiation and discussion, involving appropriate parties

Adhere to NHS Lothian and departmental guidelines on leave including reporting absence

As a major teaching and research contributor, NHS Lothian would normally expect to allocate additional SPA time for activities to do with undergraduate education, educational supervision of trainee medical staff, research and other activities. These are all areas where NHS Lothian has a strong commitment and we recognise the contribution that consultants are both willing and eager to make. Precise allocation of SPA time and associated objectives will be agreed with the successful applicant and will be reviewed at annual job planning.
